- In the 2020 presidential election, the Republican candidate received 55% of the vote and the Democratic candidate 43% of the vote in SC. In the statewide US Senate race, the Republican candidate received 54% of the vote and the Democratic candidate 44%.
 - Of US House representatives from South Carolina, 6 are Republican (86%) and 1 is Democratic (14%).
 - In the South Carolina Senate, of 46 seats held, 30 are Republican (65%) and 16 are Democratic (35%).
 - In the South Carolina House, of 124 seats held, 81 are Republican (68%) and 43 are Democratic (32%).
