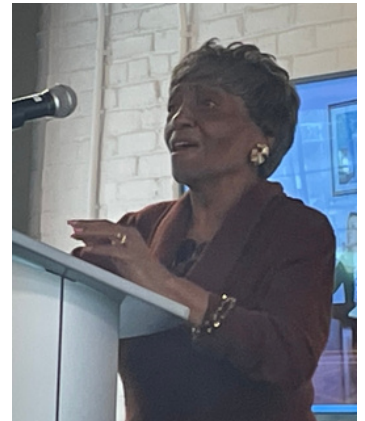
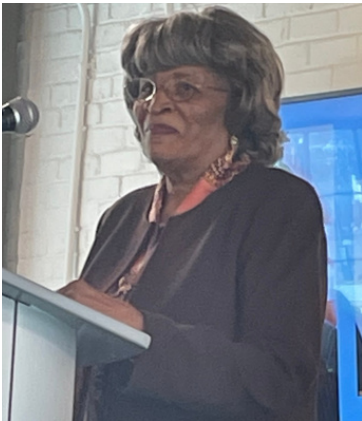

# What is Ranked Choice Voting?

Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) or Instant Runoff Voting (IRV) can solve a couple of election problems. First, it would eliminate the costly and time-consuming need for runoff elections. It could encourage more candidates to file for candidacy and attract a wider voter base because there would be more competition. Remember how many UNOPPOSED candidates ran in our recent primary? This concept is taking place throughout the US and is finally coming to SC.

The concept is that instead of choosing only one candidate, assuming there are at least three on the ballot, you would mark your 1st choice, 2nd choice and 3rd choice. If no candidate won 50% in the first run, the 3rd place candidate's votes would be redistributed according to those voter's 2nd choice. The voting machines would recalculate the new results and one of the remaining candidates would have 50%. If you would like to see how this works, go to YouTube and search for Ranked Choice Voting.

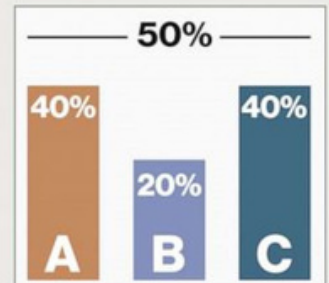
Two from this group attended a rally in Columbia on January 23 and this is what they had to say.

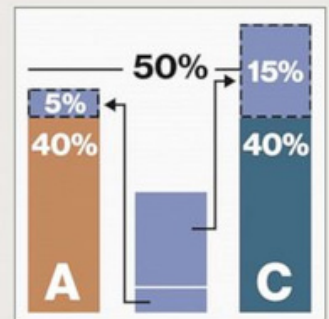
## How Ranked Choice Voting Works

If no candidate gets more than 50% of the vote, the count goes into an instant run off.

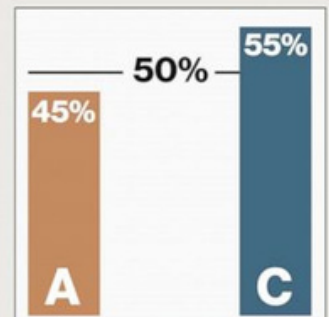
In this scenario, the candidate with the least amount of votes for first choice is eliminated.



The voters who had that candidate as their first choice will then have their vote count for the candidate they marked as their second choice.



The process continues until one candidate gets more than 50% of the votes.

# Transparency and Integrity in Education Act

As many of you may remember, I ran for Senate District 8 in 2012 and then Greenville



County School Board of Trustees in 2014. Public education, and more importantly, proper funding of public education, has been an important mission for me since all three of my children attended public school in Greenville County. My involvement with PTA's and SIC's in my children's schools led me to understand the deep devotion our teachers have to the children in our community. I know we all are aware of the numerous pieces of shameful legislation being introduced in our statehouse allowing censorship of our history, banning books, exposing our dedicated school teachers to lawsuits, limiting access to medical care for transpeople, defunding our public school system with vouchers, and limiting women's reproductive rights, just to name a few.

I traveled to Columbia on Wednesday, March 29 to hear public statements to the Senate Education Subcommittee on House Bill 3728, the bill sadly titled "Transparency and Integrity in Education Act". This session was a continuation of an earlier session where the time allotted for public comment expired. This session lasted for an hour and a half and approximately 20 people spoke in opposition of the bill. No one spoke in support of the bill. The sign on the wall stated that the maximum capacity allowed in the room was 125 people, and I did not see an empty seat. When one of the witnesses asked for those in opposition of the bill to stand, I saw no one remain seated.

There were only two senators present on the dais, Shane Massey, Republican from Edgefield, and Ross Turner, Republican, from Greenville.

This piece of legislation would limit the ability of public school teachers to teach about race inequality, gender inequity, sexual orientation, gender roles, and would subject a teacher to increased scrutiny and legal liability, paving the way for frivolous lawsuits. The language in the bill is vague, sometimes hiding the real meaning of the legislation coated in broad universal truths such as providing "quality education for all" and "mutual respect", with very little definition of how to implement this language.

People from all over the state spoke in opposition of this bill, but a large majority of the witnesses were from Greenville. From multiple members of the clergy, to professional educators, to representatives of groups such as the League of Women Voters, the NAACP, attorneys, to a law professor from USC, people from all walks of life gave impassioned speeches in opposition of the bill. Most people forecast that this bill, if law, would disenfranchise teachers, resulting a mass exodus of educators and stopping student from even considering teaching as a profession. Those who spoke cut through the rhetoric in the bill and called out the racist, censorial, comparing the restrictions proposed to Jim Crow and Nazi Germany.

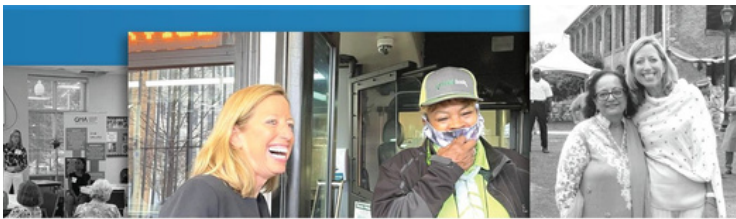
Following these bills through the labyrinthian complexity of our state legislature is a daunting task, but we must be aware and diligent in our opposition. Our partners in this fight, the South Carolina ACLU, the NAACP, numerous other progressive organizations and local LGBTQ+ groups are keeping a watchful eye on these pieces of legislation, keeping voters informed. Far-right conservative groups with innocuous-sounding names such as "Moms for Liberty", the "Freedom Caucus" along with more sinister organizations such as "No Left Turn in Education" and "Mass Resistance" are leading this charge. These national groups are highly organized and they are churning out divisive pieces of sample legislation peddled to every conservative state legislature in the nation, pushing through these reactionary, fascist policies.

Make no mistake, we are at war with the authors of these pieces of regressive, racist legislation. Follow and challenge our elected officials, remembering how they voted come next November.

## Two exciting campaign announcements

Dorothy Dowe is running for re-election in her Greenville City Council At-Large seat. Dorothy has served in this seat since 2019, triggering a shift to a Democratic majority on City Council at that time. Dorothy has worked to support affordable housing, public transportation, and to manage the city's growth, among other issues.

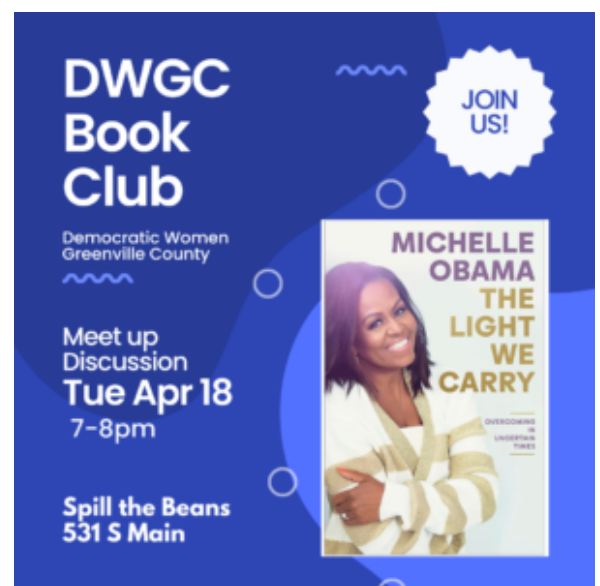

# The Absurdity of Outrage

Our Congressman, while worshipping at the altar of Marjorie Taylor Green and George Santos, feigns 'outrage' at the indictment of former President Donald J. Trump. He calls it "an egregious violation of the very foundation upon which our nation was built."



We must take pause to laugh.

I am fairly sure that our Founding Fathers did not spend much time worrying about hush money paid to a porn star, as Timmons does. "The foundation upon which our nation was built?" Too absurd to even contemplate.

The Founding Fathers did, however, worry a good deal about autocratic zealots fomenting an insurrection aimed at the violent overthrow of a duly elected government. A substantial portion of the US Constitution and its amendments are dedicated to that subject. But no matter that, we have porn stars to fret over here in the 4th Congressional District.

Such a real "egregious violation" of our democratic institutions, however, doesn't seem to worry Timmons much. Not once in his 'Statement on Domestic Terrorism at the US Capitol' does he mention Trump's name. I suppose he thinks the spark that lit the flame of violence and destruction was some kind of spontaneous combustion. Or perhaps he agrees with the Tucker Carlson narrative that the insurrectionists were just peaceful tourists who meant no harm.

Timmons is so beholden to and enamored of the former President that he cannot even begin to think for himself.

Take two examples.

First, on the stump, Timmons constantly extols the virtues of Trump's foreign policy. In fact, he compares Trump to Reagan in that regard.

While President, however, Trump was an unstudied loose cannon, insulting allies and trashing multilateral institutions:

- On Germany, Trump stated that, "I know the f—cking Krauts..." that Angela Merkle is a "bitch;"
- On Canada, Trump stated that Prime Minister Trudeau was "two-faced, dishonest and weak;"
- On France, Trump stated that he had intelligence on French President Macron's sex life and called him a "Wuss guy;"
- On NATO, Trump characterized our most important military alliance as simply "obsolete and...unfair." I am sure that would be interesting news to the Ukrainians.

At the same time, Trump extolled the virtues of the most heinous triumvirate of international henchmen in this century, his buddies Putin (a "genius" and "savvy"), Kim Jong Il ("we fell in love; we just get along") and China's Xi ("we love each other"). Really? Embarrass all of our Western allies while loving up on Russia, China and North Korea? Reagan would have lost his mind over such senselessness.

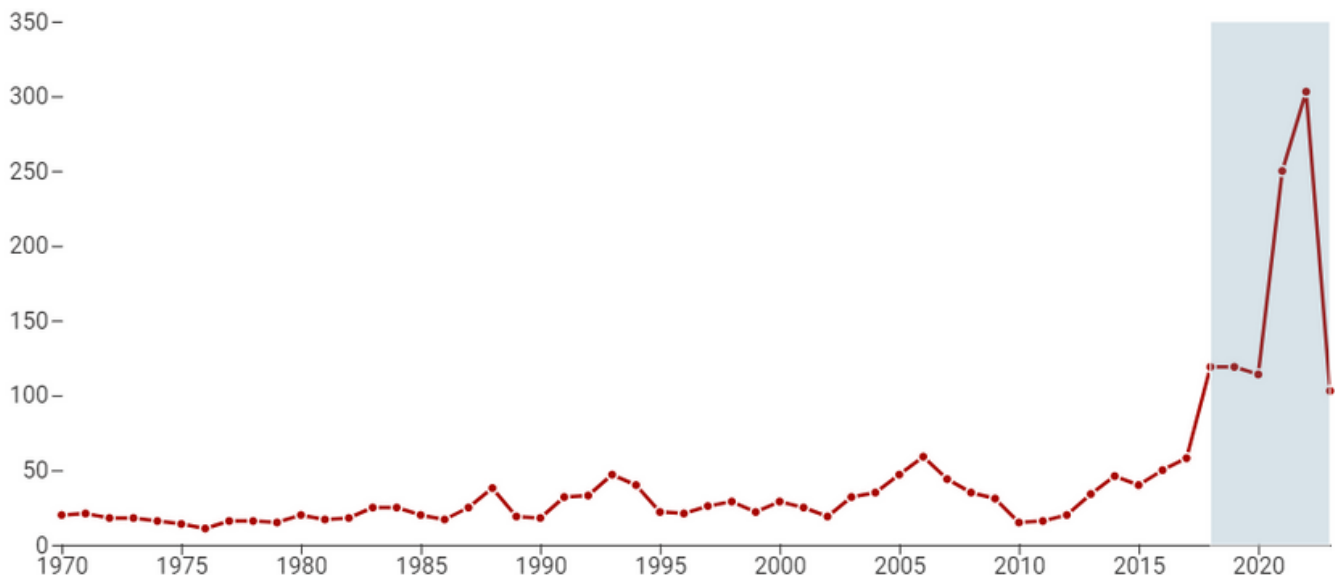

Timmons' silence on gun violence is even worse. He is a charter member of the 'thoughts and prayers' club...those Members of Congress who issue press releases and write letters with language like, "I mourn the loss of..." and "my heart goes out to..." yet do nothing to curb gun violence. Timmons was elected to Congress in 2018, and since 2018, there have been 157 school shootings in which one person was killed or injured. These school shootings alone have resulted in the death of 111 people including 63 children. What has he done...? The title of his press release of June 8, 2022, in the wake of the Uvalde tragedy says it all, "Timmons Votes to Protect Second Amendment Rights."

Which brings us back to 'outrage.' There is so much to be outraged by in this political moment. If Timmons chooses to be so outraged about a payoff to a prostitute, lord only knows how he'll react when Trump is indicted thrice more. We will await the press releases.
